

MESSAGE from the Chair & ED

DEAR PROJECT: VISION FRIENDS,

This year has left us with much to celebrate and even more to look forward to! We are excited to share our year-in-review with you as a reflection of all the important and impactful work that we were able to do for our youth and families with your support!

For the first time in almost two years, all of PV's programs returned to being in-person, and our staff welcomed back more than 325 youth to a full range of activities through our core Middle School Program and the High School Scholars Program. As youth excitedly filled the classrooms of the Youth Center and our school site partners again, we were also able to see the academic struggles and learning gaps created during the pandemic. Through our model of academic support using homework help, tutoring, and enrichment, PV was able to help 98% of youth promote to the next grade successfully, while 100% of our 8th and 12th graders graduated on time, and 100% of our seniors were accepted to college and committed to attending in the fall of 2022.

Aside from working toward their academic goals, youth also re-engaged through community service, leadership training, and workforce programs. PV youth collectively spent over 3,500 hours volunteering with local organizations and growing their 21st century skills while exploring their interests through arts, sports, and STEM activities. Also, through Project: WOW, 30 high school vouth each completed 180 hours of real world learning through paid summer internships 15+ emplovers provided bv diverse industries such as tech, business, public service, media, and healthcare. In addition to these core programs, PV also piloted two additional workforce programs, Chicago Youth Service Corp and Chicagobility, which aim to increase civic engagement while providing youth with summer work experiences. These programs, which are part of the City's larger One Summer Chicago initiative, along with WOW, provided more than 100 youth with paid internships, totaling almost 12,500 hours of real world work experience!

Another huge accomplishment for PV this year was our expansion into a second space, which was much needed as a result of our rapidly expanding programs. Our high school programs settled into a new 2500-square foot location on 23rd Street in Chinatown this summer, just a few blocks away from our original location which remains home for our Middle School Program. The additional space allows for more parent engagement activities such as the Parent Mentor Program, greater support for social, emotional, and mental health challenges through case management and counseling, and expansion of our workforce programs.

As our PV family heads into our 20th year of service, we are eager and excited to continue our current work while expanding our reach to even more youth and families across the Greater Chinatown community by deepening our work with schools, increasing parent engagement, and growing our workforce and job training programs. With our eye on these goals for 2023, we could not be more grateful to you, our supporters! Your generosity and enthusiasm for our work have fueled our growth and success so far, and we look forward to continuing this journey with you. Thank you again for believing in our mission, and we hope the success stories in the following pages will make you proud to be a supporter!

OUR HISTORY

YOUTHS SERVED **SINCE 2004**

Project: VISION was founded in 2003 by a group of five young professionals, students, and community volunteers who saw a need for neighborhood teens to have a safe place to call their own, where they could find positive role models and pave a path to a bright future.

In the fall of 2004, PV's team of dedicated volunteers piloted a drop-in tutoring program serving about 20 students each week. Since then, our core programs have reached over 1,500 youth and continue to be provided free.

We know under-resourced youths are less likely to graduate high school and to be ready for college and the workplace. Here is how PV aims to level the playing field for all youth:

- Help youth overcome barriers to success and gain equal access to education and ultimately career opportunities
- responsibility that empowers them to give back to the community and become future leaders
- Provide a safe space where youth can come together to support each other and share in common identities and experiences
- Advocate for access to diverse resources and opportunities our youth need to succeed

Project: VISION supports youth as they navigate the often challenging middle and high school years. Whether youth are building basic math skills, doing community service for the first time, or applying to college, they need the right support and guidance to grow and thrive. PV's programs provide interventions at all the critical milestones to ensure that every youth stays on a clear path to success.

GRADES 6 & 7

As youth enter the middle school years, the pace of learning accelerates, concepts get harder, and it is during these grades that students develop the right study habits and attitudes toward school. The middle school years are sometimes known as the "make it or break it" school years, when students show early signs of disengaging from school, and low performance during this time increases the likelihood of high school dropout.



PV supports this critical transition by providing students with academic support through after school tutoring and helps students strengthen basic skills in reading, math, and writing, while reinforcing good study habits.



GRADE 8

In the last year of middle school, students are most concerned with high school admissions, which is a competitive process within the Chicago Public Schools system.

Greater Chinatown students are assigned to two lower rated neighborhood schools. Thus, most students apply to other neighborhood schools, charter schools, or selective enrollment schools, which are the most competitive.



PV programs continue to help support students' academic work while staff help them apply to and prepare for high school. PV also introduces middle schoolers to service learning through volunteering in the community and participating in leadership training so that they build the social skills, study habits, and confidence they need to enter the 9th grade. PV Saturday camps and summer camps help youth explore their interests in arts, sports, and STEM while helping them develop leadership and 21st century skills such as communication, creativity, collaboration, and critical thinking.



GRADE 9..

Youth often need support during this transition between middle and high school. Academics become more challenging, and there are also many social and emotional growth milestones.

With help from staff, freshmen begin working on goal-setting and planning the next four years.

PV students are introduced to year-long project-based service and leadership experiences and start to explore their role in their surrounding communities.

GRADES 10 & 11

Sophomore and junior years are arguably the most important years academically for students - they continue to build knowledge, practice study habits, and start to think more seriously about college.

During this time, PV continues to support youth academically, while helping them get organized and prepared for the college application process through test prep classes, college visits, and mentoring.

GRADE 12



In the final year of high school, seniors get one-on-one counseling and mentoring from PV staff, with a goal of submitting at least 3 college applications and completing all financial aid applications. PV programs also prepare youth for adulthood, providing them with life skills workshops to address things like financial aid and self care, while also offering opportunities to explore careers and develop professional skills through summer internships.

We supported more than 325 students academically through daily homework help, small group and one-on-one tutoring, as well as math and ELA enrichment classes.

For the first time in almost two years, youth returned to school in-person full-time. Despite challenges related to learning gaps that developed during the pandemic, our youth persevered:




PROJECT: WATCH-OUT-WORLD

Project: Watch Out World (WOW) is a workforce development leadership program that supports 30 high school youth to become ready for the workplace through training in essential employability skills and competencies.

Throughout the school year, students improve and develop their professional skills through a series of workshops. Youths are placed in summer internships at worksite partners, where they gain authentic work experiences and continue to engage in mentoring and career exploration and planning.

SENCES. LEADERSH GHLGHI

At PV, service and leadership are an integral part of our positive youth development model to train successful students who are also active, caring citizens. By providing youth with opportunities for meaningful civic engagement, PV aims to nurture a strong sense of social responsibility in our youth and set them on a path of lifelong service and leadership within their communities. Despite this year's challenges, PV youth still managed to stay connected through our service and leadership activities.



Chicagobility engages 20 youth (ages 14-15) in a project-based service learning program that utilizes the arts to promote civic engagement, community beautification, and safety. The program introduced workforce readiness by incorporating opportunities for youth to explore careers and interests, build on social-emotional learning, and develop 21st-century employment skills. During the 6-week summer program, youth designed and created community murals around themes of Asian American experiences.

PARENTEMENTOR PROGRAM

The Parent Mentor Program (PMP) is designed to empower parents to engage in their schools and build deep lasting relationships with teachers and school staff. Parent Mentors also attend regular leadership workshops and trainings at PV to build leadership skills, receive instructional practice, restorative practice, and community education so they may become long-term leaders in their schools and communities.

This school year, parents had the opportunities to return to schools and provide in-person support. The impact was clear, as both teachers and parents of the participating classrooms recognized the support that parent mentors provide on a daily basis.
